9. REPORT FROM THE AD HOC JPA REVIEW COMMITTEE (PAGE 24)

Requested Action: Review and accept recommendations from the ad hoc JPA Review Committee, and take appropriate action as follows:

- a. Maintain existing quorum requirements as laid out in the SFVCOG's bylaws.
 - Accompanied request from the ED to each of the member offices to appoint at least two alternates to ensure attendance.
- b. Amend the bylaws to move to a numerical voting structure: 7 votes for a simple majority and 9 votes for a supermajority.

John Bwarie, Executive Director, presented a brief report on the Ad-Hoc JPA Review Committee and introduced the aforementioned agenda items. Mr. Bwarie elaborated on the proposal, which entails the allocation of two alternates to each member to ensure the maintenance of a quorum. Furthermore, a recommendation was put forth to adopt a numerical voting system as an alternative to separate votes for individual entities such as cities and counties. This methodology would empower members to abstain while still meeting the quorum requirement and effectively conducting as vote.

8. STRATEGIC PLANNING WORKING SESSION - JOHN BWARIE

John Bwarie, The Executive Director of the San Fernando Valley COG, provided a brief history of the establishment. Board members engaged in discussions about their goals for the next three years. During these discussions, they created three lists: desired accomplishments, potential barriers that could impede these goals, and unique opportunities available in the San Fernando Valley that are not present in other regions of LA County.

Strategic Plan

December 2024 to December 2028

Vision

The San Fernando Valley Council of Governments region is well-connected, well-funded, and works regionally to support local priorities within the SFVCOG region.

Mission

The San Fernando Valley Council of Governments works to increase the coordination within its jurisdictions to improve regional mobility, economy, and safety.

Introduction: Process and Purpose of this Plan

Every three years, the San Fernando Valley Council of Governments (SFVCOG) undertakes a strategic planning effort to focus attention, resources, and activities on aligned outcomes for the region. In summer 2024, the SFVCOG again undertook this effort with a first-ever board "retreat" focused on goals and priorities. The results of that meeting are summarized and expanded upon in this plan.

The plan lays out key goals and outcomes for the SFVCOG to accomplish on behalf of its member jurisdictions and the communities within them. These activities cascade from the purpose of the Joint Powers Authority and are time bound to facilitate implementation. It is expected that the plan and its actions will referenced at each meeting and as work is undertaken by the SFVCOG.

The goals and actions in this plan also build on the essential work currently being undertaken by the SFVCOG. Basic operations, regional coordination on transportation projects and solutions to address regional homelessness, and annual programs and activities will continue. What follows is renewed focus on five key goals as determined by the board for the next three to four years. Not every goal listed will be accomplished immediately, and the tactics to achieve them are designed to benefit multiple goals.

The SFVCOG has more than a decade of success, and the goal remains to deliver on projects that have been approved, are in the pipeline, or have otherwise been promised. This work ahead refines and builds on the approach to achieving these promises.



Goals

The following five goals reflect the overarching work of the SFVCOG, and below each are the tactical action steps that cause the goals to be met.

Goal 1: Deliver (i.e. make progress) on regional Measure M projects

When the SFVCOG set its priorities in 2016 and 2017 for what would become the Measure M ballot initiative, the then SFVCOG Board chose to assign allocated funds to specific projects and not future, yet-to-be-determined projects. The work now is to ensure those key projects are realized and the promises made to the region through this process are kept and funds allocated are protected for these projects. To accomplish this, the SFVCOG should do the following.

Tactical Action Steps

- 1. "Own" past successes of planning these projects by sharing a project status reports to members, key stakeholders, and media on a twice-yearly basis. Working with Metro, also share regional tax generation on an annual basis for the SFVCOG region.
- Be present and vocal on Measure M Project discussions whenever there is a status or action update at Metro or other member/jurisdiction meetings.
- 3. Identify funding gaps for Measure M projects (and their legacy projects) and work to secure those funds at the local, state, or federal level.
- Develop a cross-sector, wider-reaching mobility coalition to lead others in the region on these key mobility issues. Begin with a monthly coordination meeting modeled after the current Homelessness Coordination meetings.

Goal 2: Advocate for Regional Connectivity

As a region, the SFVCOG is served by Metro, Metrolink, and member's own transportation networks. Because of the geographic size of the region and its members, the need to make connections between and within jurisdictions continues to require a regional approach. Missing connections To prioritize and advocate for key connections and service levels, the SFVCOG should do the following.

Tactical Action Steps

- 1. Advocate for Metrolink service increases along the Antelope Valley and Ventura Lines.
- 2. Identify key physical barriers for expanded Metrolink service in the SFVCOG region and build a coalition of support for their elimination.
- 3. Secure through partnership funding for Metrolink projects
- 4. Identify the 10 priority regional bicycle infrastructure improvement projects (those that close a gap) and create a plan to close those gaps.
- 5. Identify the 5 priority regional equestrian infrastructure improvement projects (those that close a gap) and create a plan to close those gaps.

Goal 3: Coordinate the Olympic experience for the SFVCOG region

While LA28 is charged with the planning and execution of the 2028 Olympic and Paralympic Games, the SFVCOG and its members can take a lead role in ensuring that their work and the work for others provides the greatest benefit to the region, its residents, and its future. The San



Fernando Valley will see Olympic events in the Sepulveda Basin, and the entire region will see the impact of the largest global peaceful event. This is an opportunity to showcase SFVCOG communities, create a legacy through investments, and show the power of regional coordination. Only by working together can we realize the vision that so many have expressed for the region in 2028.

Tactical Action Steps

- Establish an ad hoc SFVCOG Committee to determine the most effective ways for the COG to coordinate its members, including public safety, transportation, legacy, and engagement of locals and visitors alike.
- 2. Convene a working group of staff from member jurisdictions and other officials to coordinate approaches and best practices, public safety, event "viewing" locations, communications (in language), and other joint opportunities.
- 3. Prepare businesses to benefit through procurement opportunities as well as supporting the creation of destination guides and community showcase opportunities.
- 4. Seek out public and private planning money to execute coordinated, regional activities to enhance the impact of the Games in the SFVCOG Region.

Goal 4: Establish an Economic Development Initiative to Support Small Businesses and Business Districts

Basic municipal services and the health of the community are both supported by a strong, local economy. Each member city has its priorities and strategies to serve its individual economic development needs, and regional activities and approaches can also directly benefit each member city.

Tactical Action Steps

- Identify and develop corridors of opportunities to advance and leverage transportation investments in support of business growth and success.
- 2. Host a regional, small business Economic Summit (or similar convening) that brings together hundreds of business leaders to identify needs, resources, and opportunities to grow in the greater San Fernando Valley region. This summit can focus on:
 - a. the ways local jurisdictions can support business
 - b. convening leaders of the industry clusters to determine what would be a way to support their growth.
 - Convening neighborhood-level districts to share best practices and create partnerships for enhanced local shopping districts
- 3. Convene and host quarterly Economic Development advisory meetings modeled after the current Transportation Technical Advisory Committee (TAC) meetings. These meetings would be staff driven for both coordination and opportunity development as a way to both coordinate best practices to support local business districts as well as technical support for local cities to enhance local neighborhood-serving districts (place-making).
- 4. Support local/regional procurement initiatives to help our region's businesses bid on contracts and be competitive for them by working with RAMP, creating an outreach and innovation program, and leveraging the LA City Business Source program.



Goal 5: Refine Practices for Better Regional Advocacy

At its core, the SFVCOG is about coordination and the utilization of the strength of the body is greater than the sum of the individual members. Work should be done to create a closer and more synergistic relationship among the members. To accomplish this, the SFVCOG should do the following.

Tactical Action Steps

- Flex collective power at the state and federal level through advocacy days that leverage the collective impact of all members
- Create a more effective and efficient process to collect, combine, and support member jurisdictions' unique efforts and priorities, eliminating competition between them and breaking down silos
- 3. Work to develop "novelty" within our projects to make them stand out and be more competitive for outside funding, resources, and support
- 4. Establish an annual legislative platform for State issues based on members' own legislative platforms.
- Establish standing working groups and committees as described in other sections of this plan to support greater coordination.



STATEMENT OF WORK SAN FERNANDO VALLEY COUNCIL OF GOVERNMENTS LOCAL SOLUTIONS FUND

I. Overview

Homelessness is a regional crisis. As such, one of the top priorities of the Chief Executive Office's Homeless Initiative (CEO-HI) is to continue strengthening the collaboration between the County and diverse stakeholders, including the 88 cities in Los Angeles County. Since cities have jurisdiction over planning/land use activities and have the insight to support locally specific solutions, cities play a unique role in our countywide efforts to prevent and combat homelessness. The Councils of Governments (COGs) have a unique and important role in facilitating a regional approach with their member cities to address homelessness.

The San Fernando Valley COG (SFVCOG) is a joint powers authority created by the member cities of Burbank, Glendale, San Fernando, Santa Clarita, and Los Angeles (located in Supervisorial Districts 3 and 5).

To increase the participation of cities in the County's New Framework to End Homelessness, the strategic emphasis is to create co-investment opportunities that lead to an increase in cities' ability to respond at a local level to community members' greatest concerns in alignment with the New Framework, while leveraging cities' unique capabilities to increase access to housing.

Information on the required deliverables for the Local Solutions Funds. SFVCOG shall use Local Solutions Funds (LSF) to implement activities that align with the CEO-HI's New Framework to End Homelessness. The New Framework to End Homelessness outlines the following strategies for cities and COGs.

Task 1A Description: The SFVCOG will conduct monthly Homelessness Working Group Meetings with member Cities to create a regional response to homelessness. The COG will facilitate best practices of sharing and regional coordination amongst its member cities, maintain a city contact list, develop a resource guide focused on synthesizing the programs offered by the County and Los Angeles Homeless Services Authority, enhance the COG's Homelessness Strategic Plan, and provide ongoing technical assistance and support to cities in implementing projects. By way of example, but not limitation, through a competitive grant solicitation process or Notice of Funding Availability (NOFA), SFVCOG can use LSF to award grant funding to 501(c)(3) non-profit organizations and/or educational institutions for projects located within the geographical boundaries of the SFVCOG that identify and support regional homeless and housing solutions educational outreach or training and/or identify and support efforts to develop a regional approach to homelessness strategic planning.

Maximum Contract Amount Not to Exceed: \$100,000

The following shall constitute the maximum Measure H funding that Local Jurisdiction may be allocated for each fiscal year that this agreement is in effect and as approved by the County Board of Supervisors (Board) annually:

- Year One: July 1, 2023, through June 30, 2024, contract amount shall not exceed \$30,000.
 - \$30,000 in Regional Grant Awards. If unawarded by SFVCOG in Year One, then funding rolls over to Year Two and subsequent years.
- Year Two: July 1, 2024, through June 30, 2025, contract amount shall not exceed \$30,000.
 - \$30,000 in Regional Grant Awards. If unawarded by SFVCOG in Year Two, then funding rolls over to Year Three and subsequent years.
- Year Three: July 1, 2025, through June 30, 2026, \$30,000 in Regional Grant Awards. If unawarded by SFVCOG in Year Three, then funding rolls over to Year Four and subsequent years.
- Year Four: July 1, 2026, through June 30, 2027, \$30,000 in Regional Grant Awards.

Any increase in funding to each fiscal year shall be at the County's sole discretion and implemented through a written amendment to this agreement. All Board approved allocations in this agreement are made available throughout the term of the agreement.
